1. In your garden:



In autumn, there are delicious fruits and vegetables in the garden. See if you can find some, or if you don't have a garden, ask a member of your family or someone you know if you can look round theirs (ask mum or dad first if it's OK).

left Make a hedgehog home.

There are fewer hedgehogs now than there used to be. They hibernate during the winter. This means that their heart beat and breathing slow down and they sleep until spring so that they don't need much food during the winter when it is scarce.

You can help hedgehogs to find a home where they can hibernate by piling up some logs or a heap of leaves or in a corner of your garden.

2. Out and about



Leaves on deciduous bushes and trees drop their leaves in winter. This starts in autumn, when the light levels drop and it starts to get colder. During late autumn and winter, there is not enough light for the chlorophyll (the green pigment in leaves) to be produced. So, without the green colour, leaves are left with the other colours in them that we don't see in summer, like yellow, red and orange. The trees rest, and live off the food they have stored in summer.

Co out and find some colourful autumn leaves in good condition. Dry them off if wet. Press them between pages of an old book and put other books on top. Many leaves keep their autumn colour well.

Find your local allotments and have a walk around them with mum or dad to find what they have been growing during the summer.

A water.

Find a conker or walnut shell or a piece of bark or wood to make a basic boat. Leaves with a cocktail stock pushed in and out of them make good sails. Can you attach the sail to the body of your little boat and find a way of making the sail stay upright?

Can you blow it along in a bowl of water?



Make a helicopter



Find some sycamore or ash tree seeds. They have seeds with wings. If you find a pair like this \rightarrow separate them and throw each one high into the air and watch it spin down to the ground.

less Make an Autumn Pattern

Take a pencil for a walk on a piece of paper, crossing over the lines many times, something like this:

Colour in the spaces with bold autumn colours, trying not to colour spaces next to each other with the same colour. You could then use your pattern to make a bookmark, cover a book, or put a frame round it to make a picture.

AMake a card

After at least 2 weeks, get out your pressed leaves and make some cards for birthdays coming up. You could arrange them in a pattern, or a spray, putting
