Common Blue butterfly

In Summer, there is a lot to find in your garden or when you go for a walk.

Did you know?

The **Peacock butterfly** has markings on its wings that look like the eyes of a bigger creature so that another creature wanting to eat it (a predator) is put off. The underside of their wings look like dead leaves. Why do you think that is?

They like to drink nectar from thistles, buddleia and fallen fruit. They often lay their eggs on nettle leaves. Then the caterpillars that hatch out feed on the nettles before pupating. 2. <u>Out and about</u>

Explore a wood. Take mum or dad on a walk in a wood near your house.

☆ If you look under a log or stone, you might find some little creatures hiding there. Watch, but don't poke them. Can you find out their names? Put the log or stone back carefully where you found it.

 \doteqdot Stand still quietly for one minute and listen to the sounds of the wood. What can you hear?

A Gather some long sticks and logs and make a den against a tree trunk, leaving a doorway for you to crawl into.

 \doteqdot Take a piece of paper and a wax crayon with you and make a bark rubbing.

 \doteqdot 'Write' your name on the ground with things you find in the wood, like stones, wood and fallen leaves.

 \Leftrightarrow Find 5 different types of tree in the wood by looking at the bark and the shape of the leaves.

© Remember not to pick wild flowers. Bees, butterflies and other insects drink the nectar of flowers and pollinate them so leave them for the insects, to seed and for others to enjoy.

3. Art and Craft - Make a nature pole.

Make a stick or a bamboo cane which is more than a metre long and push it firmly into the ground – the lawn if you are allowed to. (You might need some help to do this).

Sind large leaves of different shapes, sizes and colours in your garden.

When you have gathered them, thread them onto the cane, leaving a space of 5 -10cm between each one.

Sk permission to take a few flowers.

- Make a long daisy chain for the final touch.
- Wind the daisy chain into the gaps around the cane and poke some of the flowers in gaps.
- W You could find some scrap coloured paper to thread onto the cane (colourful pages from
- magazines perhaps). Cut them into leaf shapes.

Source of the second se put a third across the top to make a doorway. Join it with sticky tape or string.

Make up a story about a magical world you might find on the other side of the 'doorway'.

Make a picture.

Grass flowers are not usually very colourful but they have beautiful, delicate shapes that press well. Press some between the pages of an old book. Then, after about 2 weeks, make a picture or a card with them. They look particularly good on a dark background.
